### Growing as missionary disciples

This year, Evangelii Gaudium Sunday will be celebrated in our parishes on 15 September 2024. It gives us the opportunity to reflect on the great mandate we have been given by the Risen Lord to evangelise the whole world. "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations," the Lord commissions, as we hear in Matthew 28:19.

Inspired by our ongoing Synodal process, Scripture, and Pope Francis' Apostolic Exhortation, Evangelii Gaudium, we have chosen the theme 'Growing as missionary disciples'. On the day itself, we can encourage the faithful to pray for our parish communities, that they would become intentionally missionary in their life and witness.

Here you will find resources to celebrate the day. A second collection will also be taken on Evangelii Gaudium Sunday to support the work of the Bishops' Conference Mission Directorate. Please hold this important work in your prayers.



ree speech - what does the Church teach?

**1731** Freedom is the power, rooted in reason and will, to act or not to act, to do this or that, and so to perform deliberate actions on one's own responsibility. By free will one shapes one's own life. Human freedom is a force for growth and maturity in truth and goodness; it attains its perfection when directed toward God, our beatitude.

We live in times where free speech is under threat. The reasoning behind this attack on free speech is the concept of 'hate speech'. What is hate speech? For some, the whole of the Scriptures and catechism are hate speech - for example the church's teaching on gender: 'God made them male and female', but our children are being taught something very different in schools. It appears, on thoughtful consideration that 'hate speech' is simply speech that someone finds hateful - it is essentially a subjective judgement. The powerful will decide what is hateful, and you will comply, or face the consequences. This development is all based on the idea of keeping us safe, but is it? Have you started to think twice about posting comments on social media? Do you look around and lower your voice when talking about controversial subjects, or do you just avoid anything that might cause offence? This

is a weakening self-censorship that is directly in opposition to being

a bold and joyful Christian missionary, as the Pope has asked us to be on this Sunday. When we are so worried about causing offence, perhaps it is time to reconsider where this fear is leading? Salt that loses it saltiness is fit only to be thrown away (Matt 5:13) 3

aint Robert Bellarmine (1542-1621) was a prominent Jesuit theologian, cardinal, and Doctor of the Church. Known for his intellectual rigor and deep spirituality, Bellarmine played a key role in the Counter-Reformation, defending Catholic teachings against Protestant reformers. His most influential work, Disputations on the Controversies, addressed critical theological debates of his time. Bellarmine also contributed to the development of Church doctrine, emphasising the importance of Scripture and tradition. Canonised in 1930, his legacy endures through his writings and devotion to faith. His feast day is celebrated on September 17, honouring his dedication to both truth and charity

ildegard of Bingen (1098–1179) was a German Benedictine abbess, mystic, writer, and composer. Known for her visions, which she recorded in works like \*Scivias\*, she was a pioneering figure in Christian mysticism. Hildegard also composed sacred music, creating one of the largest repertoires of medieval plainchant. She contributed to theology, philosophy, and natural science, writing texts on herbal medicine, the human body, and the cosmos. Her correspondence with powerful leaders, including emperors and popes, showcased her influence in religious and political spheres. Hildegard was canonised in 2012, recognised as a Doctor of the Church for her theological impact.
