
S aint Anthony the Great, also known as Anthony of Egypt or Anthony of the Desert, is not formally canonised in the sense we understand in the modern Catholic Church. Canonisation as an official process was only instituted in the 12th century. Instead, early saints like Anthony were recognised by the Church through popular acclaim, widespread veneration, and acknowledgment of their holiness and miracles by church authorities.

# Why Saint Anthony the Great is Venerated:

- 1. Life of Holiness and Asceticism: Anthony is considered the founder of Christian monasticism. He withdrew to the desert around 270 AD to lead a life of prayer, fasting, and solitude, setting an example for future monks and hermits.
- 2. Inspiration for Monasticism: His life story, recorded by Saint

Athanasius of Alexandria in the *Life* of Anthony, inspired countless others to pursue ascetic and monastic practices. This text played a critical role in spreading his reputation throughout the Christian world.

- 3. Spiritual Warfare and Teachings: Anthony was known for his battles against demonic temptations, which became emblematic of spiritual warfare. His teachings emphasised prayer, humility, and detachment from worldly goods.
- 4. Miracles and Healing: Stories of his miraculous healings and intercessions contributed to his widespread veneration as a saint.
- 5. Patron of Monastics: As the "Father of All Monks," Anthony became a spiritual figurehead for monastic communities.

His sanctity was universally recognised, and he is celebrated on his feast day, January 17, in both the Eastern and Western Christian traditions. While he was never formally canonised, his legacy and contributions to Christian spirituality firmly established his status as a saint. Today's Feast: The manifestations of Christ that we celebrate during Christmas Time culminate in the Baptism of the Lord. On the last day of the Christmas season, may we think of how we will be open to allow Christ to be manifested in our lives. Let us resolve to consciously choose to follow Christ more closely and take seriously our baptismal call to live as disciples.

#### t Nicholas Church Castle Hedingham

Last Sunday, 5th January, saw our first Mass at St Nicholas following our move from St Peter's in Sible Hedingham. We are very grateful to all who have helped to make the transition as smooth as possible and making sure all of our resources have found a new home at St Nicholas. Fr Felix, along with the 30 or so parishioners who attended, has created a little bit of history - it seems very likely that this was the first Catholic Mass held in the Church in some 500 years. The original Church was built in the late 1100's (around 1180) - although there was an even earlier wood built Church in 1138. The Church was further developed and became an important centre for the Catholic Church. It seems likely that the was a Priory associated with St Nicholas Church and Hedingham Castle and it was seen as a pilgrimage site on the route to Bury St Edmunds. John De Vere, the 15th Earl of Oxford, was a great supporter of Henry VIII th and so was an active participant in ensuring the Reformation changes, that created the Church of England with the Act of Supremacy in 1534, were fully implemented.

The Parish has now helped create a little bit of Church history with Catholic Masses at both Hedingham Castle and St Nicholas. It really is a magnificent building and well worth a visit just to take in the architecture, the famous wheel window above the altar and the tomb of John De Vere and his second wife.

Mass will be held at St Nicholas on Sunday at 9.00 am and parking is available at the Castle Hedingham Memorial Hall and at the Wheatsheaf public house.
