



The Lord bids us to give him our concerns and anxieties because he is trustworthy and able to meet any need we have. His grace frees us from needless concerns and preoccupation. Do you seek the Lord attentively? And does the Lord find a welcomed and honoured place in your home?

Always welcome the Lord into your home and heart

The Lord Jesus desires that we make a place for him, not only in our hearts, but in our homes and in the daily circumstances of our lives as well. We honour the Lord when we offer to him



everything we have and everything we do. After all, everything we have is an outright gift from God (I Chronicles 29:14). Paul the Apostle urges us to give God glory in everything: "Whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through

him" (Colossians 3:17).

When you sit, eat, sleep and when you entertain your friends and guests, remember that the Lord Jesus is also the guest of your home. Scripture tells us that when Abraham opened his home and welcomed three unknown travellers, he welcomed the Lord who blessed him favourably for his gracious hospitality (Genesis 18:1-10; Hebrews 13:2). The Lord wants us to bring him glory in the way we treat others and use the gifts he has graciously given to us. God, in turn, blesses us with his gracious presence and fills us with joy.

Lord Jesus, to be in your presence is life and joy for me. Free me from needless concerns and preoccupations that I may give you my undivided love and attention.

t. Christopher, revered as the patron saint of travellers, holds a significant place in Christian tradition due to his legendary life and enduring symbolism. His importance stems from the inspiring narrative of his faith and service, which resonates with themes of protection, sacrifice, and devotion. According to legend, Christopher, a man of great physical strength, sought to serve the greatest king. Initially serving a worldly ruler, he later discovered Christ as the true King. His most famous story involves carrying a child across a river, only to find the child's weight nearly overwhelming—revealing the child as Jesus, bearing the world's weight. This act cemented Christopher's association with safeguarding travellers.

His veneration spans centuries, with pilgrims and wayfarers invoking his intercession for safe journeys. The St. Christopher medal, often worn or carried, symbolises divine protection in an uncertain world, offering comfort to those facing physical or spiritual journeys. Though historical details are scarce and his sainthood was debated during the 1969 calendar reform, his cultural and spiritual impact endures. St. Christopher's story inspires selflessness and trust in divine guidance, making him a beloved figure for those seeking courage and safety in their travels.



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hat kind of world did St Francis of Assisi live in?

I find the world I grew up in is changing rapidly. My childhood was full of givens: a trustworthy medical service, reliable and affordable postal services, a large and effective military, MPs who responded to questions personally with regard to your interests, policemen who directed you when lost, and who arrested criminals; a court system the envy of the world, largely free of corruption and bias, a robust prison service where the guilty were punished. Hard work would allow you to buy a house and have a family. These givens are fading. I weave around ever larger potholes, an ambulance can now take eight hours to arrive, the Post Office & NHS and have been caught in cover ups over computer systems and infected blood supplies, my MP uses artificial intelligence to reply to my letters, and corruption in the police and courts are revealed on a weekly basis. It appears a sort of chaos is slowly emerging.

The world St Francis grew up in (1181-1226), was far, far worse. Local families controlled warring city states with private armies, opposing forces would suddenly arrive and demand support, political killings were rife, instability was the given. Life expectancy was around 30-35 due to high infant mortality. Plagues and famines were commonplace in Assisi, with lepers a common sight. Travel was severely limited due to bandits controlling the old Roman roads - these thieves would attack any person who dared to venture out alone, so private security details were essential. Law and order were practically non existent for most people. You only trusted those you knew and your close family, dealing with wrong doers using the vendetta.

St Francis had one major concern: not making Assisi great again, but the complete renewal of the Church, which had started to reflect the corruption he saw around him. For St Francis, life was brief - he only lived for 45 years, but he wanted to spend his time on that which mattered - the eternal. When we look at history, we see how easy we have had things; like our patron saint, we too should now cling to the Cross as things around us start to unravel, and pray for the Church as our only security.
